

FUN FACT: Tom James

One of the biggest myths surrounding 6cylinder motivated Corvettes was their supposed sluggish performance. Magazine road tests of the day prove otherwise. With 150 hp and an agile 3.55:1 rear axle ratio, the 2,850-pound 1953 Corvette turned 0-30 mph in 3.7 seconds, 0-60 mph in 11 seconds, and the quarter mile in 18.0 seconds. These

figures beat the contemporary Jaguar XK-120, Porsche 356 coupe, Aston Martin DB2-4 saloon, and Austin Healey 100. The others may have had higher top speeds and better corner-carving capabilities, but in a drag race the Blue Flame 6 Corvettes always came out on top against factory-stock challengers from these competitors.

The 1953 Corvette cylinder head is among the rarest Corvette part in circulation. It was the only head in the Blue Flame 6 engine family with casting number 3836066. Only 300 were installed in cars (plus perhaps two dozen service replacement parts for warranty coverage), and it was not shared with any other passenger-car or pick-up truck Tricksters have come up with application. epoxy-enhanced cheater heads, but the revised digits are not magnetic. General Motors changed the casting number to 3836241 in 1954, so there is no relief there.

Looking on the bright side, at least the Corvette's inline 6 only takes one of these hen's teeth head castings.

Deception ... A Factory Hot Rod Gary Myers / Rod Russell



A few weeks after our tour and very informative meeting at Noel Grace's Factory Hot Rods shop I attended and judged at a local car show sponsored by the Columbus Indiana Corvette Club ... a group in existence since 1976.

At the show was an amazing Resto Mod created by Noel Grace. The creation was named "Deception". Obviously, as you can see by the four trophies, everyone felt it was an outstanding vehicle.

The owner, Gary Myers told me this was the second Corvette Resto Mod he had Noel build for him. The first was mostly what Noel thought should be done ... and was insanely fast. "Deception", this car, was more than 90% Gary's ideas. Gary wanted a car built around his dreams and imagination.



About two years ago Gary talked to Noel about what he wanted to create. Noel went searching and found a 1965 Corvette with a wrecked front end. He added a 1958 front body clip. Gary has extensive pictures of the construction. One big part was making the front clip fit and getting a cove built into the doors. They used the 1965 frame.

The modifications are too extensive for a short newsletter article, but here are a few to give you an idea how well this Resto Mod is based. An LS-3 GM crate 430 hp engine, Shark Bite suspension, Tremec Magnum 6-speed transmission, offset control arms front and rear HDS ABS electric over hydraulic power brakes ... etc., etc.

The color on this creation is amazing ... it is a Maserati color that Gary saw while attending a car show in Colorado.

The interior has the same meticulous planning involved as the rest of "Deception". Notice the gauge color in the following picture. It is Ferrari yellow.




When Bruce first found this car it was a basket case. The car was an old gasser completely stripped and in red oxide primer. And it came with a bunch of extra parts.

The car had originally been a red, fuelie, 4 speed with a red interior.



Bruce assumed the extra parts were just a few items, not 5 truckloads of OE parts, NOS parts and a treasure trove of old speed equipment parts. Bruce was amazed what was before him, but had to go back two more times before buying the basket case. Bruce's wife Joyce pushed him over the edge, "Don't be stupid, pay him what he wants ... this is a great project." Bursten's 57 Corvette (Cont.)



Over the next two and a half years Bruce, with a lot of help from his wife and friends, brought the gasser back to life.



During the build Bruce gives much deserved credit to his wife for not only convincing him to buy the project car, but also for helping finish it. Joyce wired most of the car including the engine harness and under the dash.

This awesome time machine has been at the Danchuk Tri-Five Nationals in 2017 and 2018. In 2018 Bruce's son, who at 45 years old had never been down a drag strip, took Dad's Vette on three separate fun runs.
